Summer is here... and we're off! Many of us are looking to travel this summer. We're mostly vaccinated, and we have been cooped up for a long time. We're raring to go! Travel for us is a luxury. We choose destinations based on interest, climate, or emotional attachment. These past few Torah Parshahs offer us a different perspective on travel. Our ancestors' travel was not for pleasure; it was a necessity. They needed to leave Egypt, and its oppression and slavery, and settle as a free people in the land of Israel. Their journey was a hard one. Shortages of food and water were frequent. Shelter was minimal. Hostile people attacked them. Their travel was hardly a vacation.

Today, thousands of people across the world are on the move fleeing violence and oppression, but they have no promised land to which to travel. Shortages of food and water are frequent, shelter is minimal, and they are often taken advantage of by smugglers, pirates, and thieves along the way. At our own border sit thousands of refugees fleeing drug cartels, violent gangs, and corrupt governments. A recent investigative report revealed how migrant children, held at Fort Bliss in El Paso, Texas, are being abused by our immigration officials and system. Travel was not a matter of preference or taste for them, it was a desperate attempt to escape a horrible situation.

As we take to the highways, airports, or cruise lines this summer, let us remember how lucky we are. Let us also remember those, who like our ancestors, do not travel by choice, and do not have our options. As we emerge into what, God willing, will be a wonderful summer, let's remember our ancestors, both the ones who journeyed to the land of Canaan (Israel) and the ones who journeyed to Flemington or Hester Street. I ask you to go online and to search for "HIAS = www.hias.org/." This is the organization that helped our grandparents and great grandparents settle in this great county. Read what they are asking us to do to fix immigration in the USA, and take an action they suggest. As we approach the High Holidays, let's pay forward some of the joy we can expect to experience in the coming months.

WE DID IT!

Farmland Ride 2021 was the most successful and memorable bike ride yet. Faced with a ridership more than double what we had in 2019, logistical challenges of a wedding at the FJCC and a county emerging from the COVID pandemic, we left an indelible impression among our riders who had only positive feedback. We heard uniform praise with comments such as "great ride," "friendly people," "beautiful routes," "great food," and "so well organized" (though that leads me to wonder how disorganized some other rides are!).

Back in February at the height of the pandemic when we started planning the event, we had great apprehension whether there would be any interest at all! But, as the months passed and the registration quickly passed 50, then 100, 150, 200, 250, finally hitting 280 the day pre-registration closed, we knew we'd have to pull out all the stops to make this ride a

memorable one for the bikers and a financial success for the FJCC. Despite the threat of rain a couple days before the event, we added another 30 riders on the morning of the event for a total of 310 riders, coming from as far as Brooklyn, NY, Stroudsburg, PA, and Philadelphia, PA!

A special "thank you" to the core Farmland Ride committee of Dena Scibilia, Chair of the Committee, Mitch Clarin, John Fellin, Nomi and Jack Forman, Barry Mittler, and Sharon Rednor, who worked endless hours fussing over the details of the ride, including getting permits for parking and the use of the rest stops, securing sponsorships, coordinating printing the brochures and the banner, ordering the T-shirts, arranging for lunch, buying the snacks and making the peanut butter and jelly sandwiches for the rest areas, laying down the colored arrow markers on the routes, and staging the tables, tents, coolers, posters, and food for the FJCC registration and the

rest areas. Thank you, Kimi and Kylie Mittler and Matthew Rednor for helping to transport the tents and food to the Rest Area.

Thank you, Jim Fox, Carolyn and David Goldman, and Nadine Milecofsky, for checking in our pre-registered riders and to Jeff Doshna and Sharon Zimmerman for logging in our day-of-event riders. Thank you, Jeff and Amy Marshal and Marjorie Rednor, for helping our riders to park in the designated lots – and to Keith Gerstein for being our fortress to keep riders from entering the FJCC parking lot! Thank you, Evie and Phil Stern and Adah and Alan Radzin for staffing the Frenchtown Rest Area (where our 62-milers stopped); I think some of our riders come back just to see Phil and Evie in Frenchtown – three years now! Thank you, John Fellin, Zel Gerstein, Marcie Zuchovicki, and Kim and Samantha Muller for taking care of the E. Amwell Rest Area where all 300+ riders stop to refresh. Thanks to Nomi and Jack Forman and Marvin and Shellie Jacobson for checking in our returning riders, and to Jason Gertzman, and the Byne, Rodriguez and Weitz families for distributing the event T-shirts and the delicious lunches that Blue Fish Grill provided. And thank you to our volunteers at large, Bruce and Susan Kamich, Sharon Winnick, and Pam Nemeth for taking care of everything else that needed a helping hand. I hope I captured all our dedicated and generous volunteers – forgive me if I've missed anyone.

You folks are the reason our riders return year after year and spread the word about this wonderful event. And, oh yea, mark your calendars for June 12, 2022, our fifth Farmland Ride!

Every four to six weeks, I join with other United Synagogues of Conservative Jewry small congregation leaders to learn about issues that impact their congregations and different approaches we take. As you might imagine, a major topic of discussion these past months has been how we are managing our return to the sanctuary. Surprisingly, until this month, more than half of the congregations remain entirely virtual or with only a tiny fraction of members allowed into the synagogue. Few are fully open even with

restrictions; even fewer have allowed onegs and Shabbat kiddush to resume. And while I won't fault other congregations for the choices they make, I'm proud of the COVID Taskforce we've engaged to advise us every step of the way, using the best scientific information to drive our decisions. We are fully open for services and in-person meetings with the understanding that our vaccinated members (the vast majority of those eligible) are welcome without masks or distancing, while those not yet vaccinated will remain masked and distanced. We look forward to welcoming everyone back to the sanctuary for the High Holidays.

Well, I guess it's only appropriate that I end with some biking chuckles:

Every day is a gift.

How do we honor the victims of a tragic event? Unfortunately, as Jews we recognize on a large scale, what loss is and how devastating its reach can be. When tragedy is avoidable, it rubs salt into our collective wounds as we watch tragedy unfold, like a miserable, slow motion reel.

It is no different with the collapse of the condo in Surfside, North Miami Beach, that occurred on June 24th. We still do not have definitive answers to the many questions that persist, but the consensus, at least preliminarily, is that the collapse may have been entirely avoidable.

Miami is my hometown. Growing up there was an incredible experience. I had friends from all walks of life and most of them figured out how to speak Spanish relatively quickly (the most common language spoken in Miami homes). In the 80s, my Miami was about college football, and, on TV, it was “Miami Vice” (on NBC) and the cocaine cowboys (on the nightly news). In the 90s, Hurricane Andrew began the decade, but fashion and murder closed it. In the last two decades, Miami has exploded into a metro area boasting the busiest international airport to the Caribbean & Latin America, the most attractive people in the country (according to Travel & Leisure readers), and a tremendously diverse population: half of Miami’s 6 million residents are born outside the U.S. and most learn English as a second language.

These statistics make a tragedy like the Surfside collapse all the more far-reaching and global. Notable victims like the nanny to the children of the First Lady of Paraguay were in the building at the time of the collapse; thankfully the children were not. But there were also your everyday, middle-aged dads, like my brother’s high school classmate and friend, Edgar, who called him Wednesday, June 23rd. My brother Chris declined the call, texting Edgar that he was on vacation with his sister and both our families. He’d return the call the next day. But Thursday, June 24th came too late—the building had already collapsed at 1:20am. Chris texted Edgar later that morning: “Is now a good time to call you?” Edgar never had a chance to respond. His remains have yet to be found.

There were also Soccer Moms, although in the case of my friend Erika, a Cheerleader mom. Erika’s mother, Francis Plasencia (number 40 of 44 in this article) would drive us to cheer at games, competitions and to attend social activities during high school. She was the mom with the station wagon and we all piled in, long before seat belts were mandatory! Francis doled out advice and pep talks on our drives as expertly as she did the ice cold water bottles she handed out during those long, sweltering late days in the Florida sun, cheering on the football players of Belen Jesuit Prep School. Francis was confirmed dead on Tuesday, July 6th.


Or the Guara Family, another painful connection through another high school friend, who perished together: Marcus and Anaely alongside their two precocious daughters, Lucia (10) and Emma (4). The girls were buried together and their funeral, along with their parents’, were among the first held after the collapse; sadly there will be more.

Among the victims are several members of our community—the Jewish community. Sadly, about a third of those missing or deceased are part of the local synagogue in Surfside. As the article in the Miami Herald from July 4th weekend pronounces, “Everybody in Miami knows somebody from that building.” I wish it weren’t so true.

But, as we know, stories of great loss are lined with hope, inspiration, courage and love for our fellow humans. Countries as far away as Israel sent rescue teams to the site, refusing to check-in to their hotel upon arrival, instead heading directly to the scene and getting to work immediately. The Mexican-Jewish rescue organization CADENA (“chain” in Spanish) also sent a team to assist in the rescue/recovery. There is a glimmer of hope in the stories of camaraderie among the diversity and heroism. Over 30 people were initially whisked off of the debris pile immediately following the collapse.

So how do we honor the deceased? Live every second to the fullest, enjoy every moment as precious, relish time with those you love—this is the least we can do to honor the memories of those who can no longer do so.

I’ve thought a lot about my hometown. I’ve checked in with Erika and my brother for news about the missing, and I appreciate more than ever something Chris said after we tried to reach Edgar: “Every day we wake up is a gift. Every moment you have breath is a blessing.”



Family Promise is still here, for those in need. The partnership between Flemington Jewish Community Center and Family Promise of Hunterdon County is now in its seventh year. Every August and December, our synagogue has served as a temporary shelter for our neighbors in need, also providing meals, fellowship, and more.

Current circumstances do not allow for guests in the program to shelter in our building. However, they still need our assistance. Families are staying at a local motel, and each host congregation is providing groceries during their scheduled week of service.

In lieu of traditional congregational hosting, Family Promise is accepting donations to offset expenses for off-site shelter, food, and supplies for five families in need during this still precarious time.

A Summertime Classic: The Burger (and "Beyond")

Guacamole "Beyond Burgers" with Spicy Sweet Potato Wedges

Ingredients:

For the Spicy Grilled Sweet Potato Wedges

- 3 small sweet potatoes
- Extra-virgin olive oil, for drizzling
- Pinches of chili powder
- Pinches of smoked paprika
- Pinches of cayenne pepper, optional
- Sea salt & freshly ground black pepper

For the Guacamole

- 2 ripe avocados
- Juice of 1 lime, more if desired
- 1/4 cup diced white onion
- 1/3 cup chopped cilantro, including stems
- 1/2 to 1 jalapeno, diced
- Pinch of cumin
- Sea salt

For the burgers

- 4-6 Beyond Burgers
- 4-6 hamburger buns

- Sliced red onion
- Sliced tomato
- Butter lettuce

Instructions

1. Bring a large pot of water to a boil and parboil the sweet potatoes until they're barely fork tender. Remove from the water. When cool to the touch, slice into wedges.
2. Make the guacamole: In a medium bowl, combine the avocados, lime juice, onion, cilantro, jalapeño, cumin, and pinches of sea salt. Mash until combined. Season to taste.
3. Preheat a grill to medium heat. Drizzle the sweet potatoes with olive oil and pinches of salt and pepper. Place on the hot grill and grill 5 to 6 minutes per side, or until well charred. Grill the Beyond Burgers according to the package directions, about 3 minutes per side.
4. After removing the sweet potatoes from the grill, sprinkle with the chili powder, smoked paprika, cayenne, and more salt to taste.
5. Serve the Beyond Burgers with the guacamole, desired fixings, and sweet potato wedges.
