January 2022 is TuB'Shvat month!

"Tu" is a pronunciation of the Hebrew letters for the number 15, and it falls in the Hebrew month of "Shvat," which parallels January and/or February. We celebrate Tu BeShvat joyously. We have a seder and eat tasty foods. But, 2,000 years ago, in Israel, Tu BeShvat was a tax day. The Torah established that the land was a gift from God and that we are tenants on God's land. So, every year we showed our gratitude by paying taxes from the produce for the land to the Temple in Jerusalem.

For different seasonal products, there were different dates established as the tax, of fiscal, year. The Rabbis called all these dates Rosh HaShanah, "New Years," and there were four of them. The one in the winter is Tu B'Shvat, the New Year for Trees. This date was originally just a date for the end of the tax year for fruit trees. There were no rituals associated with it. However, trees and their fruits were very important and symbolic to the Rabbis. The mystics of Safed enhanced this holiday with a special meal, a Tu B'Shvat Seder. Twentieth century Zionist educators made it a tree planting holiday to help redeem the land.

Tree-planting teaches delayed gratification and the important role of human effort in bringing about redemption, rather than waiting for the sudden appearance of a messiah. Rabbi Yohanan ben Zakkai, who lived in Jerusalem when the Romans were sacking it, said: "If you have a sapling in your hand and are told, 'Look, the Messiah is here!' You should first plant the sapling and only then go out to welcome the Messiah."

What an amazing notion: the world is at the point of ultimate redemption, but first..., plant that sapling! What more important lesson can we learn for our lives today. As Noam Zion writes in "Seder Tu B'Shvat," Tu B'Shvat is the type of holiday each generation is invited to add its own ripples and wrinkles. Let us add ours, and re-commit to God's command to be good tenants of the earth on which we live.

President's Letter

Happy 2022! With the turn of the secular year, comes a newly elected FJCC Board of Trustees. Thank you to our outgoing President, Bruce Moskovitz, who led the FJCC valiantly through the maze of difficult issues related to Covid. Congratulations to our new third Vice President, Kim Muller and the entire 2022 Board. I greatly appreciate your continued commitment to the FJCC and look forward to an engaging year ahead.

As the new President, I'll take this opportunity to introduce myself to those who do not know me, and reintroduce myself to those I have had the pleasure of knowing over the past 23 years. Here goes my attempt to sum up my life in 200 words.

I grew up in Allentown PA with my parents, two sisters and a sweet dog. We attended an Orthodox shul where I was a reluctant Hebrew school student until we joined a Reform temple with welcoming, friendly kids. As a family, we were constantly traveling and visiting friends. So, by the time I finished high school we had been many places -- DC, the Wisconsin Dells, Disney, the Grand Canyon, Mexico, Canada, Yugoslavia, and Israel to name just a few. Finally, I found the right fit planning HIV/AIDS prevention programs throughout New Jersey. I took a long break while I raised my children, and a few years ago started working for the US Census Bureau.

My husband, Austin, and I live in Readington and we have three 20-something children, Marjorie, Matthew and Ethan. As many of you know, I had a daughter, Miriam, who died as an infant. We moved here and joined the FJCC in 1998. Shortly after, my children were enrolled at the FJCC Nursery School and Hebrew School. I am reluctant to speak for them, but I'd guess that some of their fondest memories are of the activities they shared with their FJCC friends.

Now that I am a newly crowned "empty nester," I look forward to leading the FJCC Board. It will be a group effort, but I am hoping we can move through the tunnel of Covid seclusion and return to vibrant services and engaging in-person activities. One of my highest priorities is enhancing the warm FJCC environment and encouraging meaningful relationships between our members, while learning, exploring spiritually and having fun. The idea is expressed so well in "The Little Prince" by Antoine de Saint-Exupery.

Vegan Cheese

Cringe or Binge?

If you're vegan, or paleo or dairy-intolerant, you want to keep kosher and have the sensation of a "cheeseburger" without breaking kashrut...or you just stay away from dairy, you may have been tempted to try vegan cheese. Any walk through the "healthy" section of a grocery store might find you standing in front of a mega selection of dairy alternatives. There are the various cheeses made from nut milks (cashew or soy, for example), but there are also cheeses made from hemp, oats, and rice, as well as others.

So what's a non-dairy eater to do? First, you can try your own taste test with some of these readily available brands found at groceries in the area:

- Chao (sold at Wegmans, packaged as a block or sliced)
- Go Veggie! (sold at ShopRite and Wegmans; cream cheese and shredded versions)
- Miyoko's (sold at Wegmans; variety of various flavors and preparations, including cream cheese and sliced)
- Violife (sold at various grocery stores; comes in sliced, block and shredded cheeses in various flavors)

OR - you can let someone do the work for you...like, <u>Women's Health magazine</u>, which taste-tested <u>80</u> vegan cheese brands and concluded which were the best 15!

So the verdict is this: If it were 2010, vegan cheese might be a decision based on strict diets or religious orthodoxy, because back then the alternatives were, well, maybe one brand (Daiya comes to mind). Now, vegan cheese has come a long way. Competition and a desire for healthier living has increased the alternative and healthminded choices that are available to us. and that means their competition is now actual cheese. So, if you haven't given vegan cheese a try before, check it out and write to the editor to let us know what you think! Happy sampling!
