# The Land

In the Torah portion Behar, we learn: "God spoke to Moses at Mount Sinai, saying...the land shall rest a Shabbat for God," or perhaps "shall rest in a godly Sabbath." (Leviticus 25: 1-2) Rashi, the great Torah commentator, asks: "What does the Sabbatical have to do with Sinai?" Why, among all the many commandments, should this be specifically designated as spoken at the Mountain? The Talmud (b. Sanh. 39a) explains the commandment this way: "Plant for six years and rest in the seventh, so that you will know that the land belongs to God." My teacher, Rabbi Art Green,

God."
My teacher, Rabbi Art Green, asks: But, in the broadest sense, isn't this the purpose of all the other commandments as well?!
The earth is filled with God's presence since its creation. That did not begin at Sinai. Torah was given to provide us with a way to discover that presence, and a path of living in response to it. What is it about the Shmita year, the Sabbatical year, that the Torah should go out of its way to say that it was given on Mount Sinai?

Rabbi Green suggests that the Sabbatical rule takes Shabbat, the most distinctive practice of Jewish living, and applies it to the land itself. What better way to teach that "the whole earth is filled with God's glory?" Our call to treat our particular land this way, Rabbi Green argues, is paradigmatic, teaching reverence for the earth as a whole. The Land of Israel, the Sefat Emet teaches, became an exception to the category of lands in order to teach us about the holiness of all land, of the very soil itself. Torah has no more important lesson for our generation. We need to understand that this reverence for land, for the earth, comes from Sinai itself. How would we treat the earth if we keep in mind that its care is commanded at Mount Sinai, the very mountain on which Moses received the 10 Commandments? Not everything crucial could be

Which commandments they would include in the top 10, so to speak, varies by individual. At the moment our ancestors stood at Mount Sinai, God knew what they needed to hear first. God understood the priorities of the day for the people God was addressing. Which of our ancestors back then could have imagined that the world, as they knew it, could be so threatened by human action, and inaction, as it is today? So far, Rabbi Green admits, our attempts to give our planet its due respect are pretty slow in coming. There is much reason for disappointment. But, we have not given up. We must continue to work for the end of our addiction to fossil fuels, even as we recognize the challenges to doing that. "Never despair," writes

# This Month in Jewish History

# The "Spirit" of this St. Louis Haunts to this

It is June 1939. A passenger ship called the M.S. St. Louis roams the seas in desperate search of a port for its passengers. Where they eventually docked would be the death of some of those passengers.

In 1790, George Washington responded to a letter from Moses Seixas of the Hebrew congregation of Newport, Rhode Island, quoting Seixas' own words back to him. Seixas' had requested of the newly-elected President Washington that his fledgling republic would give to "bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance..." Washington's letter in response quoted these words back to Seixas in agreement. Yet 149 years and 31 presidents later, the United States would do just that...

Over nine hundred passengers were crammed onto the St. Louis when it set out for...well, anywhere, but Germany. It was 1939. Jews were several years into the anti-semitic laws passed by the Nazi government. Half of the German Jewish population had already fled; following Kristallnacht, remaining Jewish families felt it was time to flee as well.

The original destination for the ship was Cuba. Most of the passengers on board had the correct immigration documents, however, due to disapproval from Cuban citizens, as the ship neared Havana, the entree for most passengers was denied (those who were allowed to enter were mostly non-Jews, or Jews with special visas). Some passengers attempted suicide at the news that they weren't allowed to disembark...one succeeded. Upon this news, many citizens of both the US and Cuba sent cables of protest, but they were ignored. One resident of Virginia wrote:

[The] press reported that the ship came close enough to Miami for the refugees to see the lights of the city. The press also reported that the U.S. Coast Guard, under instructions from Washington, followed the ship . . . to prevent any people landing on our shores. And during the days when this horrible tragedy was being enacted right at our doors, our government in Washington made no effort to relieve the desperate situation of these people, but on the contrary gave orders that they be kept out of the country. . . . The failure to take any steps whatsoever to assist these distressed, persecuted Jews in their hour of extremity was one of the most disgraceful things which has happened in American history and leaves a stain and brand of shame upon the record of our nation.

The ship was forced to leave Havana harbor with all but 30 of its original passengers on board. In the days that followed, every Latin American country denied entry to the St. Louis. The ship was denied access to US ports as well; asylum-seekers were told to wait for the process to play out. The ship then turned north and Canada followed suit, for fear that "shiploads" of other immigrants would head to Canada as well. With no other choice, the captain made the decision to return to Germany. Belgium accepted 200 passengers, Netherlands accepted 194, and the UK and France accepted the rest. With the hindsight of history, we know these nations (with the acceptation of the UK) were not immune to the scourge of Nazis rounding up and imprisoning or murdering Jews. But not all the passengers passed in the Holocaust...(from Wikipedia):

Based on the survival rates for Jews in various countries during the war and deportations, historians have estimated that 180 of St. Louis refugees in France, 152 of those in Belgium and 60 of those in the Netherlands survived the Holocaust.[19] Including the passengers who landed in England, of the original 936 refugees (one man died during the voyage), roughly 709 survived the war and 227 died.[20][10] Later research tracing each passenger has determined that 254 [29.2 percent] of those who returned to continental Europe were murdered during the Holocaust.

As a result of the events that transpired and the responses in each nation the ship tried to reach, many nations have since tried to make amends...

- Germany Post WWII: the ship's captain, Gustav Schroder, was awarded the Order of Merit by the German government; 1993: posthumously one of the Righteous among the nations at the Yad Hashem Holocaust Memorial, Israel
- Canada 2011: Canadian Jewish Congress creates the Wheel of Conscience Monument, the back of which lists the passengers of the ship; May 2017: a formal apology is announced by Prime Minister Justin Trudeau; the apology was issued on November 7, 2018 by the House of Commons
- United States 2009: Senate Resolution 111 was delivered to the State Department Archives marking June 6, 2009 as the 70th anniversary of the incident; 2012: a ceremony is attended by Dep. Sec. Bill Burns and 14 survivors from the ship during which the US government formally apologizes for its role in the event
- Book 1974: Voyage of the Damned, written by Gordon Thomas and Max Morgan-Witts
- Film 1976: Voyage of the Damned, released by Avco Embassy Pictures in the US

# Giving Garden Summer Update

The FJCC Giving Garden has once again expanded.
We now have TEN garden beds in which to grow vegetables for Flemington Food Pantry patrons.
Our newest bed was formerly our compost bed.

Thanks to volunteer extraordinaire, Virgie, the cucumber plants growing in the former compost bed from discarded cucumbers were lovingly dug up, and replanted after the bed was filled with soil (gifted by Home Depot. Thank you Home Depot!!!!) There were so many cucumber plants growing on their own that we've planted more along the edges of additional garden beds.

Our new compost system is super easy for all to add their compostable kitchen scraps to. It is behind the dumpster, so no more walking into the garden. And there is no cover, so all you have to do is dump your coffee grounds, egg shells, and fruit and vegetable remains right on top of the pile and walk away. Easy peezy. So please set aside your scraps and bring them to our new compost bed. A big thank you to Glenn Gold for building the new compost system. And for much great guidance about growing food.

As has been our custom, the Toddler, Nursery, and Pre-K classes, (six in total), came into the garden to plant their kale and tomatoes and beets and corn and zucchini and onions and sunflowers that were

growing in their classrooms since

April. It's so much fun to witness their individual approaches to planting. Some are gentle and loving. Some are timid and don't want to feel the dirt. Some are careless and rough. And all are excited when they spot a worm. No matter their method of planting they did a great job and with additional tomatoes, peppers and watermelon planted by Virgie and basil, eggplant, and cucumber planted by me our beds are completely filled.

In addition to planting, the Pre K students had a lesson in composting and every child threw an old onion, apple or orange into the compost bed. So much fun!!!!!!

We are looking for whole families, couples or singles to adopt one week this summer to water the beds. This commitment can take as much as four trips or as little as zero depending on the rain and sun. I promise it will make you feel really good.

# DISCOVER THE BEAUTIES OF HUNTERDON COUNTY ON THE FJCC'S 5<sup>th</sup> ANNUAL FARMLAND BICYCLE TOUR
