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RABBI'S REFLECTIONS

My colleague, Rabbi Joseph Berman, reminds me that there is a texture and rhythm to Jewish time. There is the mundane of the week..., and the kedushah, the sanctity & specialness, of Shabbat. There is Pesach with the focus on liberation, and the Days of Awe with a focus on teshuva (return/repentance/transformation).

We are now in the month of Adar. In the texture of Jewish time, Adar is the month of joy. The Talmud teaches: when you enter into Adar, you increase in joy. Ke-she-nichnas Adar, marbim be-Simchah. This year is a leap year, so we get, not one, but TWO Adars. Anyone need an extra shot of joy?



Adar 2 is when we celebrate Purim, the reason for joy this month... or both months. The Purim story is about a world turned upside down: a Jewish orphan becomes a Persian queen, and a high-ranking official who plans to kill the Jews dies at their hands. Nothing seems what it is, and it is not surprising, therefore, that this holiday is celebrated by wearing costumes, allowing us to become someone else for a day.

But, there is a dark side to the Purim story: the end, where there is a massacre of the enemies of the Jews. As Rabbi Jill Jacobs points out: "The ending of the Purim story can certainly be read as a legitimate battle of self-defense... This understanding eases concerns about the nature of the violence, but does not fully respond either to the bloodiness of the battle or to the textual ambiguity about the identity of the victims... The sheer number of deaths is shocking...; simple self-defense would not require the killing of such large numbers of people. Second, there is little suggestion elsewhere in the Megillah that Haman's feelings toward the Jews reflect the popular attitude. ...If other citizens of Shushan plan to participate in the slaying of the Jews, they will presumably do so out of obedience for the king... and not...as a result of their own independent hatred of this people."

RABBI'S REFLECTIONS

This concern also nagged at some classical rabbinic commentators. The Malbim, for instance, wrote: "Of course, the Jews were not given permission to kill anyone they wished... They only killed their enemies whose animosity... was public, and who threatened... them, but not their haters... The difference between an "enemy" and a "hater" is that an enemy's hatred is evident, whereas a hater's hatred is hidden... They only did to their haters "as they wished," that is, they were able to rob them and to degrade them."

The Malbim understands the great scope of the slaughter described at the end of the Book of Esther, and wishes to reduce it to those who actively sought to kill the Jews, excluding those who simply hated them passively. For Rabbi Jacobs, such attempts to lessen or to justify the deaths of more than 75,000 people do not fully respond to the question, well-known to us also from human history, of how an oppressed people can go on to oppress another people.

The ethical challenge of the Purim story becomes even more serious when we read it conjunction with the Torah portion for the Shabbat before, which includes the command to wipe out Amalek in every generation. As Rabbi Jacobs points out: "The juxtaposition of the reading of Parshat Zakhor with the reading of the Megillah transforms the Purim story from a one-time event to a paradigm for using violence to respond to any opponent."

Perhaps, we may be relieved to learn that most of our Halakhic decisors will not allow us to walk down this path. They rule that this Mitzvah with regard to Amalek only applies in the times of the Messiah, because any remaining Amalekites have dispersed and assimilated into other nations. It is impossible to fulfill this mitzvah until the Messiah comes, and clarifies the issue for us. And, according to Maimonides, even if we could identify some Amalekites, we are required to offer them peace before attacking them. Indeed, if they agree to follow the Noachide laws (basic standards of civilized behavior), or even convert to Judaism, Maimonides teaches, they should be accepted.

Unfortunately, too many contemporary Jews have walked down the path of becoming like their oppressors, and identify Amalek in their contemporary foes. Let us reject this approach, and live up to the tradition our rabbis have taught. Perhaps, being relieved of a commandment to shed blood is the best reason for joy in the month(s) of Adar.

The following week, on Sunday, March 17th, the sweet essence of hamentashen will eminate from the kitchen as we bake yummy treats for all to enjoy. This is an opportunity for all -- experienced bakers and newbies -- to join the baking party.

Then, on Saturday, March 24th, there will be Seudah Shelisheet at 7:00 followed by Ma'ariv, Havdalah and the Traditional Megillah Reading. Of course, there will be hamentashen for dessert afterwards.





The FJCC Cares delivery list has been growing, and we need volunteer drivers to distribute our Shabbat Bags. Let the office know if you would like to help.




