RABBI'S REFLECTIONS

Happy secular new year! This month, we begin the Book of Exodus, which tells the story of the enslavement in, and eventual exodus from, the land of Egypt. The great commentator on the Torah, Sforno, writes: "Our ancient sages teach that the children of Israel living in Egypt... did not change their names, language or manner of dress. This was a sign that they kept the traditions passed onto them by Jacob."



An interesting idea: identity through names, dress and language.

It's worth noting that Pharaoh gave Joseph an Egyptian name: Tzofnat Pane'ach. While Joseph continued to be called Joseph by his family, I wonder whether Egyptians only knew him by his Egyptian name? And, although Joseph spoke the language of his ancestors, he clearly spoke Egyptian as well. As far as dress is concerned, Joseph certainly dressed in Egyptian fashion; this was probably one reason his brothers did not recognize him. So, if the Israelites, in general, may have kept their traditional, names, language and dress, it would seem Joseph did not.

How do we maintain our identity as Jews while living among non-Jews? Are our names, language or dress different from those of our non-Jewish neighbors? Well..., we DO take Hebrew names, but like Joseph we also have names that we are known by in the secular world. How do we dress? Well, we wear head coverings and Tallises in the synagogue, but how many of us where these outside Schul? Our language... well..., we used to speak Yiddish one or two generations ago... but how many of us still do? And of those of us who can speak Yiddish, how many carry on such conversations on a regular basis? We do study Hebrew, but... how regularly do we use Hebrew to communicate?

When it comes to names, language, and dress, we operate a lot like Joseph. One of the great challenges facing Jews in North America is one of identity: how do we stay faithful to the traditions and wisdom lore that have helped us stay alive these passed 2000+ years? Our ancestors kept their names, dress and language... What do we keep? Especially at a time when many of us feel less safe than we used to, What is it we do to maintain our identity as Jews?

As we begin 2024, what can we commit to do that will maintain our sense of being Jewish? I invite all of us to think on this.







Clifford Case and the Challenge of Liberal Republicanism

Author Presentation on January 21st 12:00 PM

Dr. William R. Fernekes (B.A., MA, Ed.D., Rutgers University) is pleased to announce the publication of the first comprehensive biography of the former U.S. Senator from NJ Clifford P. Case.

Clifford Case and the Challenge of Liberal Republicanism tells how N.J. native and Rutgers University graduate Clifford P. Case became a leading figure in the post-

WW II Republican party, championing what he called "modern Republicanism." For 33 years in the U. S. Congress, 9 in the House and 24 in the Senate, Clifford Case was a powerful voice for civil and human rights, environmental protection, ethics in government, and a global role for the U.S. in combating the spread of communism and promoting democracy.

Case was determined to uphold honesty and integrity in government, introducing legislation on financial disclosure years before it was required by law, while pursuing an end to the Vietnam War when it became apparent U.S. policy was causing more harm than good. Case also was a forceful advocate for New Jersey, working closely with his senate colleague Harrison Williams and other members of the state's Congressional delegation to advance the state's interests in Washington. He was a dedicated human rights advocate and was one of Israel's most ardent defenders in Congress.

Case's most difficult political challenges came not from Democrats but from GOP conservatives both in New Jersey and nationally. With other liberal Republicans like Jacob Javits, Charles Mathias, and Edward Brooke, Case helped to pass landmark civil rights and social welfare legislation in the 1960s despite opposition from conservative Republicans and segregationist Democrats. This book details the liberals' legislative successes while explaining their failure to maintain influence in an increasingly conservative GOP by the late 1970s and early 1980s.

Dr. Bill Fenekes and his wife, Sheila, are longtime members of the FJCC. Bill led the development of the Holocaust education program at Hunterdon Central during his 36 years as an educator at the school.
