### **RABBI'S REFLECTIONS**

Cheese is one of my favorite food groups. This is so, even though I am lactose intolerant. And, next month we celebrate the holiday Shavuot, when it is customary to eat dairy products. I am always excited for this holiday (though I also stock up on Lactaid pills). Shavuot is a harvest holiday, and, traditionally, marks the moment when we received the Torah at Mount Sinai. We chant the Ten Commandments, and also read the Book of Ruth, which occurs during the spring harvest. So, why do we dairy products on Shavuot?



Some derive the practice directly from the Torah, where it calls the land of Israel "a land flowing with <u>milk and honey</u>" (Exodus 3:8). Other places in the Bible also offer inspiration for this practice such as "milk and honey are under your tongue" (Song of Songs 4:11). Others suggest that, at Sinai, the Israelites were considered to be as innocent as babies, whose food is milk.

Those of kabbalistic bent <u>equate the numerical value</u> of the Hebrew word halav, (milk) 40 ('het'=8, 'lamed'=30, 'vet'=2), with the number of days Moses spent on Mount Sinai, receiving the <u>Ten</u> <u>Commandments</u>. Others look to the mountain itself. Mount Sinai, in the Book of Psalms, is called the mount of gavnunim (68:15), meaning many peaks. That description reminds them of the Hebrew word gevinah, meaning cheese.

Modern Scholars, who trace many Jewish customs and rituals to practices common among various ethnic groups, claim that spring harvest festivals characteristically featured dairy dishes, perhaps because cheese was produced during that season.

Some see support for this custom based on the spiritual development among the Israelites in the wake of Sinai. After the Torah was given, they were obligated to follow its laws, including those governing dietary practice. As they returned to the camp from the revelation, they could not eat the previously prepared meat, which had not been done according to the laws of kashrut. Since butchering and cooking fresh meat would take too long for the tired, hungry Israelites, they took the dairy food that was readily available.

### **RABBI'S REFLECTIONS**

In some Jewish communities, it is customary to follow the traditional dairy meal with a meat dish, because, traditionally, we are also supposed to eat meat as a contribution to our joy on a festival day. This can cause practical problems, however, because you cannot mix milk and meat, or the dishes and utensils used to prepare them. There is also the required amount of time one must wait between meat and milk (1, 3 or 6 hours, depending on the tradition). Therefore, in some communities, it is common to have a dairy meal on the first evening of Shavuot, and then serve meat the next day. For some, these two foods also represent the two loaves brought to the Temple as offerings on the Shavuot festival.

The tradition of eating dairy on Shavuot goes back a long way. It's not clear what initially sparked this practice. However, as with many Jewish traditions, it is the practice that captures our imagination, whereas the reasoning may have become lost over many centuries. Perhaps the point we should keep in mind is that Judaism is a practice. We carry on traditions that are meaningful, and that connect us, as a people, through time and across space. It is ourpractices that bind us, and that have preserved us through the millennia. As long as we pass these on to the next generation, Judaism will survive. As our parents passed these onto us, may we pass these on to those who come after us, adding links to the long chain that connects us to each other, and all the way back to Mont Sinai.

Happy Shavuot!
