# RABBI'S REFLECTIONS

February is Jewish Disability Awareness & Inclusion Month (JDAIM). It is a unified national initiative, during the month of February, to raise disability awareness, and support efforts to foster inclusion in Jewish communities worldwide.

Historically, Medieval and ancient Judaism did not have an organized approach to Jews with disabilities. Like many contemporary cultures, people with disabilities were looked upon with pity, fear and even resentment. This attitude prevailed well into the 19th century.

Jews DID have leaders and teachers who had disabilities, Moses being the most famous. Moses had a speech impediment which lowered his self-esteem and made him afraid to confront Pharaoh. Our rabbis recognized this. However, it took advances in science to get them to think that disabilities were not, somehow, indicators of personal or moral character.

The best-known example of an evolution in Jewish law about people with disabilities is that of the case of the deaf-mute. According to biblical law, and that of the ancient and Medieval rabbis, deaf-mutes are frequently classed with minors and the mentally challenged. They were considered unable to enter into transactions requiring responsibility and independence of will. In many cases, their claims upon others, or the claims of others upon them, could have no validity. Still, to preserve peace and order, the Rabbis made special provisions for this class in civil, criminal, and ritual cases.

For example, the deaf-mute, after having satisfied the court as to full understanding of a transaction, could buy and sell movable goods, but not real estate. Since deaf-mutes had no legal power of acquiring property, if they found anything, they were not entitled to the possession of it, and anyone might take it away from them. The Rabbis, however, considered this an act of robbery; and, again, in order to preserve the peace of the community, they decided that such property must be returned.

Whether the classification of a deaf-mute as legally incompetent is absolute, or whether this classification admits of changes, is the source of great disagreement among the halakhic authorities. Although, as we approached modern times, Jews began to realize that deafness did not represent an intellectual or moral deficit, rabbinic authorities could not agree on how to facilitate a change in the halakhic status of deaf.

# RABBI'S REFLECTIONS

The 19th Century saw significant improvement for the deaf Jewish community, with the opening of the Austrian Institute for the Israelite Deaf and Dumb in 1844, followed by similar schools in England (1865), Germany (1873) and Hungary (1876). The poskim, or halakhic authorities of the time, were asked about the halakhic status of those who had been educated in these schools – did they still have the same disadvantaged status that the Talmud assigned to the *cheresh*, to the deaf? Of course, being rabbis, they disagreed.

Rav Ovadya Yosef, the late Sephardi chief Rabbi of Israel, who died in 2013, was willing to reconsider the halakhic status of a deaf-mute, either because the person had learned to speak, or on the basis of a more direct re-assessment, namely, that this person's actions made it clear that she or he has intelligence. He categorically wrote that one should rely on those poskim who rule that a deaf-mute definitely has full halakhic status, when it comes to rabbinic issues. The practical implications of Rav Ovadya's position are enormous.

Jewish approaches to disabilities are anchored in ancient conversations. These conversations have evolved over time. And, over time, new knowledge and advances in science, have re-shaped the parameters of rabbinic thinking. We now face the challenge of living in this new Jewish reality: how should we relate to people with disabilities? What should we do to include them? 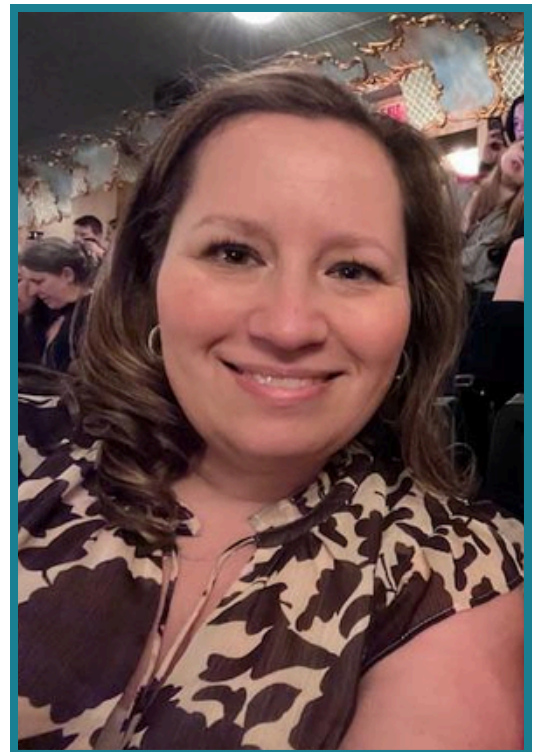
I look forward to working with you all to make the FJCC a place we are happy to be in together and to discuss the 2025 Jets winning season.

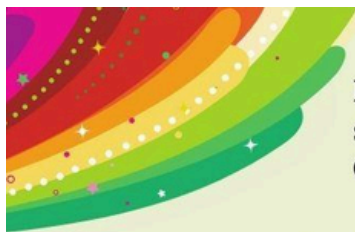


# Bat Mitzvah Spotlight



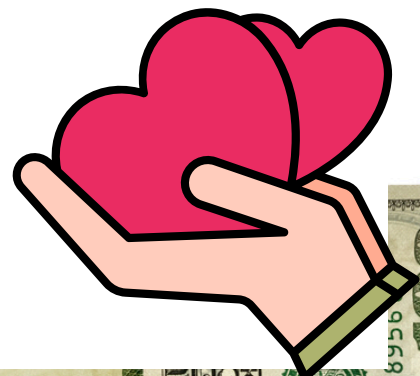
