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
RABBI'S REFLECTIONS

The poet, Tyler Knott, writes: "Mountains know secrets we need to learn. That it might take time, it might be hard, but if you just hold on long enough, you will find the strength to rise up." In Judaism, we have two very important mountains who know secrets we need to learn. Both are symbolically crucial to the Jewish people. In his book, Sinai and Zion, Jon Levenson contrasts these.

Interestingly, Mount Sinai never receives the kind of building attention Mount Zion does. No one constructs a temple there. No permanent shrine or marker is erected on the very spot God gave the Torah to the Jewish people. Sinai does not even fall within the boundaries of land of Israel, even as these change over the millennia. As holy as Mount Zion is, as holy as the city of Jerusalem is, we've never forgotten Mount Sinai. The City of Jerusalem was, indeed, the ancient center of Judaism in which we expressed our devotion to God, but Sinai was the place that God appeared and showed Divine love for us.

Sinai, and the tradition of wandering, also provided our ancestors with an important model for how to be Jewish when the Temple no longer stood in Jerusalem. We could reach back into our past and find another model by which we could maintain our Jewishness. No glorious architecture, just a profound appreciation for God's presence wherever we were willing to let God in, even while dwelling in the most barren of places. This model of relating to God has been a source of comfort and inspiration for millennia.

Today, we are struggling to cope with the conflict and violence, both internal and external, that are engulfing Israel, with Mount Zion at its center. Let us take a little comfort in our ancient tradition of acknowledging God in any place that we may dwell. This type of acknowledgement allowed our ancestors to feel the presence of God as


PAST EVENTS






