## **Rabbi's Reflections**

I listened with great interest to our speaker this past Yom HaShoah. I thought about her grandmother's flight from Europe, and how lucky she was to get out when she did. It very much reminds me of my own grandmother's flight from Vienna, two or three years later.

Both Michelle Edgar and I had lucky grandmothers. Most of their peers were not lucky. One out of three Jews living on planet earth were murdered between 1939-1945. It is an astounding statistic. As awful as that statistic is, statistics are not very relatable. For humans to wrap our heads around such facts, to really grasp them, we need to see an individual. We need to hear their story. Accounts of human experiences, individual accounts, are central to how we relate. And when I write "individuals," I don't mean presidents, prime ministers, and kings - I mean ordinary folks, average citizens.

When Michelle Edgars was telling us her grandmother's story, in the small town in Germany in which she lived, I thought about some of these ordinary folks, her grandmother's non-Jewish neighbors. What choices or decisions did they make when the Nazis came to power?

My grandmother, may she rest in peace, was able to get out of Vienna in 1939, after Kristallnacht. The vast majority of my grandmother's non-Jewish neighbors, as she tells it, were not horrible people. They did not participate in pogroms, or murder Jews, or even beat them up. They were average citizens, many of them professionals: lawyers, doctors, engineers, and smallbusiness people. They also, the vast majority of them...did nothing to object or resist.

When the Nazis came to round up Jews, most of these "upstanding" citizens stayed behind their closed doors, turned up the radios, opened up their newspapers, and did... nothing. Now, to a certain extent, it is not fair to judge others who find themselves in circumstances in which I have never been. On the other, I can, at least, learn lessons from history, and from the people who lived through it. What choices or decisions will we make?

For my part, I can try to be truly upstanding, when my neighbors are at risk. No, we are not living through another Holocaust, but we are living through a period of nativism, xenophobia, and institutionalized prejudice. We cannot change the laws by ourselves, but we can make our voices heard, and lend help to those who need it.

In any circumstance I find myself, I try to hold myself to the ethical standard my grandmother would have wanted. And, this... is not easy. But, whoever said making the right decisions is going to be easy?

May we all accept the burden of a difficult and moral life.

## From the President's Desk

Recently, I attended the American Jewish Committees Global Forum 2025 in NYC. It really was a global event with over 2,000 participants from over 60 countries. Over three days, we heard from world leaders, explored a variety of issues impacting the Jewish community and learned ways to defend and uplift the Jewish community worldwide.

Above all, it was a place where Jews from around the world could feel a sense of community and share in the emotions that many of us are feeling. Sometimes Jews feel like they are alone and the whole world is against us. Attending the Global Forum reminded me that Jews and Israel have many friends and that we need to continue to do what we can to foster those relationships.

I particularly enjoyed meeting and hearing from Jews living outside the United States. Since the horrors of October 7, Jews worldwide have had to confront increased antisemitism. No place has this increased antisemitism been worse than in the western democracies. Jews at the event from France, Australia and Sweeden painted a grim picture of life there even considering leaving for safer surroundings. In contrast, the Jews from of Central/South America and Eastern Europe appear to be experiencing a much safer environment.

It has never been more evident to me that Jewish strength is grounded in Unity. We must proudly standup for Israel and the Jewish people everywhere. As Hillel said, "if I am not for myself, who will be for me?"







## **GRAD CORNER**

## **Giving Garden**

Barbara Clarin and friend Donna Drewes helped me shovel excess soil out of the garden beds and to the spot where 100 daffodils will be plants next October.

Rabbi Cohen and Hebrew High students Ian Rodriguez, Lindsey Rodriguez, Ian Weitz, Rose Weitz, and Jamie Cohen took on the important task of shoveling mushroom compost into the beds. (Thank you to Amy Cook for suggesting this upgrade.) Rabbi Cohen was a workhorse, while the teens caught up on the latest Hunterdon Central gossip.

Rich Goldstein trimmed the tree branches hanging over the garden so that our plants will get more sunshine, and also repaired a cracked PVC line. Nathan Lefkow made an important repair that enabled our hose to attach properly to the faucet. Nathan also had our soil tested.

Vergie planted lettuce, tomato, cucumber and okra plants she grew in her basement over the winter, and the FJCC Nursery School students planted and are caring for cucumbers, Swiss chard, beets and basil in their classrooms. They will transfer them into the garden May 20th and 21st. Also planted in cups was Phil Stern who is taking another crack at growing peppers. Last year's crop were truly pretty but a bit shy when it came to the actual pepper part. Karen Walsh donated peppers, tomatoes and eggplant plants that, with Jonathan Nemeth's and my help, were planted on Mother's Day. Also on Mother's Day I planted peas, beans, zucchini and butternut squash seeds directly in the ground. Direct-ground planting is something we really haven't done much of and I'm excited to see how it goes this season.

Lastly, Boy Scout, Jason Snyder, a 17 year old Junior at Hunterdon Central and graduate of the FJCC Nursery School many years ago, made three significant upgrades to the garden as part of his Eagle Scout project, a large community service project in which the Scout acts as General Manager, making a plan, raising the funds for and buying the materials, arranging for helpers on work days, and completing the project to the satisfaction of the beneficiary. Jason's project was a 3-parter: 1) Replace our 10 oldest garden beds with 10 identically-size new beds. 2) Replace the decaying gate with a new gate, keeping the decorative Star of David. 3) Cover all grassy areas with garden gravel to both eliminate the need for mowing within the fenced area and hopefully help with the problem of excess water pooling in one corner.

Jason completed the project in just four work days with a great number of Scouts and family members coming out to help. Additionally, our very own Jim Fox pitched in two of the work days. I'm told by the Scouts that he was a "work horse" who never took a break, even when doing the heavy lifting. Jim, and everyone who has helped so far, thank you!!! We are on track for a great growing season!!!!

Please visit our garden. Deposit your veggie scraps, egg shells and coffee grounds in our compost bed. Donate plants. And ask what small thing you can do to help those in need in our community.

### Why I am a Jew-Sisterhood Scholarship Winner!

Why am I Jewish? Well, it's because my mother is Jewish of course. However, that begs the question: Why am I still Jewish? It is a difficult time to be Jewish, so there must be more keeping me a Jew than just my heritage. Judaism has afforded me many opportunities and experiences that span from preparing for my Bar Mitzvah, sharing my knowledge with others, and being part of a larger Jewish community that will carry me beyond high school and the FJCC.

My Bar Mitzvah, and the work leading up to it, was a major milestone in the development of my Jewish identity. Over two years, I practiced service parts, taught myself trope, and learned my entire Torah portion and Haftorah. When the day of my Bar Mitzvah came, all of my preparation paid off, and I led the Friday and Saturday services in their entirety. Beyond the satisfaction of my hard work culminating in my Bar Mitzvah, I learned a crucial lesson on how to work hard. I can thank Judaism and the FJCC community for that opportunity and learning experience. Soon after my Bar Mitzvah, I began tutoring students for their B'nai Mitzvahs. Teaching was a fantastic experience that gave me the opportunity to pass on my knowledge of service parts, Torah, and trope to younger students, as well as to give back to the community that helped me prepare for my Bar Mitzvah. Tutoring also taught me how to teach. With each new student came a unique set of strengths and needs. For example, some of my students were especially proficient at reading Hebrew, while others were better at memorizing the tunes for prayers. As a result, I adapted my teaching strategies to optimize the learning experience for each student. In doing so, I became considerably better at tailoring my lessons to the student, which has been incredibly useful when helping classmates with physics, chemistry, and the SAT.

Tutoring has heightened my awareness of people's different communication and learning styles and has led to profound personal growth. I recently committed to Binghamton University. Among the reasons I chose Binghamton is the vibrant Jewish life on campus. The 26% Jewish population is incredibly exciting and comforting, and seeing students walking around wearing kippot makes the campus feel very open and accepting. I plan to get involved in Binghamton Hillel and Chabad events; Chabad recently held a Shabbat dinner where over 2,000 students attended-the largest student attendance at a Shabbat dinner in the nation. Since Jewish life on campus is the next step in the evolution of my Jewish identity, I placed great importance on Jewish presence when selecting a college.

Overall, the skills I have developed through Hebrew school, tutoring, and being part of the FJCC have had a profound impact on my development as a person. I am more knowledgeable, I can read Hebrew, trope, and Torah, and I am a better teacher. For all of these reasons, I wasn't just born a Jew. I have stayed a Jew, and I will forever remain a Jew.


