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RABBI'S REFLECTIONS



What's a Jew to do on Christmas Eve? Before Christmas Eve became the commercial and cultural spectacle that it is, it was a religious holiday that Jews tried hard to avoid. Christmas was a time of heightened anti-Jewish violence, and Jews were, in many places, not allowed outside on that day. In pre-modern times, on Christmas Eve, our ancestors observed Nittel Nacht. The evening is marked by refraining from Torah study, and engaging instead in recreational activities, such as playing card games or chess. Today, among some Hasidic Jews, this practice continues.

What does "Nittel" mean? I have seen a few explanations for its etymology. "Nittel" could come from the Hebrew root meaning "to hang," since Jesus was hanged on a cross. Another suggestion is that it is from the Latin "natalis," meaning birth, since Christmas Eve is celebrated as Jesus' birth. A third suggestion is that "Nittel" is related to Yiddish "nit" or "nisht," meaning "not, nothing," perhaps indicating that Jews should not do anything meaningful or significant to mark the day..., though..., NOT doing anything significant could be... kind of significant?

Whatever the original meaning, the practice has been handed down to us: we do something on Christmas Eve that has nothing to do with why the holiday is celebrated. (Chinese food, a movie, karaoke – not common activities in Bethlehem at the turn of the last millennium). Outside of ultra-Orthodox communities, Jews are more integrated into the wider culture than our ancestors were. Many of us have non-Jewish relatives with whom we celebrate both Jewish and non-Jewish holidays. The openness to celebrating holidays of different faith traditions is a great blessing, and... also a challenge. Honoring the freedom we now have, while maintaining our unique identity, is the struggle of modern times.

When I was in junior high school, our downstairs neighbors began hosting Christmas parties – Glatt kosher from Meal Mart. We were the only Jews they knew, when they first moved in. I grew up modern Orthodox, my family kept strictly kosher, and the neighbors wanted to be hospitable. I think I was the only kid in my Yeshivah who attended a Christmas party every year. This continued when I moved away to college. Once, I thought of going away over winter break. My mother scolded me: "Louise is spending a fortune on food... and you're NOT coming home for Christmas!? What kind of Jew are you?!"

I think my great-grandparents would have been shocked... and also very confused. But, me: I got it.

I still love the idea of Chinese food and a movie on Christmas Eve. When I was quite young, way before those neighbors moved in, my Christian friends asked me how I celebrated Christmas. I said: Chinese food and a movie. I could've said that I don't celebrate Christmas, which was true, but... kosher Chinese food was hard to come by back then, and we didn't go to the movies THAT often when I was little (three little boys in a movie theater – you can only imagine). We didn't play cards or chess, but we didn't study Torah either. I guess we marked Christmas by not doing anything really meaningful or significant... only..., that now seems..., kind of significant.

I highly recommend Sarah Hurwitz's recently published "As a Jew Reclaiming Our Story from Those Who Blame, Shame and Try to Erase Us." It is a deeply personal exploration of Jewish identity in the 21st century that will likely resonate with you as it did with me.

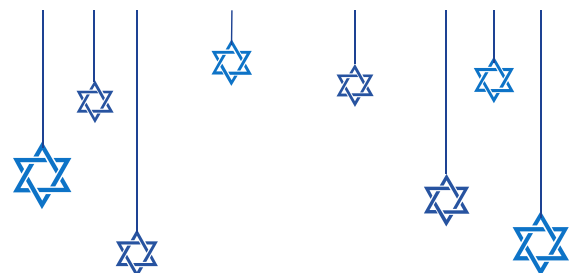
What sets *As a Jew* apart is the way Hurwitz situates her own story within the broader Jewish narrative. Reading this book made me reflect deeply on my own background and the ways I've come to understand my Jewishness. Hurwitz's honesty about her journey—how she grappled with identity, ritual, history, and belonging—prompted me to revisit my own experiences and thinkings. At moments, I felt affirmed. Other times I was unsettled with some of my own actions including the times I've as hidden my Judaism and support of Israel. Hurwitz's words nudged me to consider which parts of Judaism I carry with pride, which parts I've taken for granted, and how my personal history shapes the way I move through the world as a Jew. It's rare to find a book that doesn't just inform you but actively helps you to clarify your feelings.

One of the most striking sections of *As a Jew* is Hurwitz's discussion of the long arc of antisemitism—how forms of antisemitism have shifted across centuries while its underlying logic remains disturbingly consistent. She lays out how Jews have long been cast as the ultimate "Other," and how societies have projected their fears and failures onto us. Over the centuries, this has taken wildly contradictory forms including blaming Jews as "killers of Christ," imagining them as racial pollutants, and portraying them as shadowy masterminds controlling media, finance, or global politics. Hurwitz shows how this ancient pattern continues today, morphing into modern political, cultural, and ideological strains.

Her analysis helped me see more clearly how, in the current moment, both "the Jew" and "Zionism" have become for some (many?) people the reason for everything they believe is wrong with the world. It's a painful but honest reckoning, and one that feels essential for understanding today's discourse.

Hurwitz is a former speechwriter for Michele Obama. As such, the book is easy to read and once you pick it up hard to put down. Check it out, you won't regret it.

Howard and Cheryl Rosenbaum

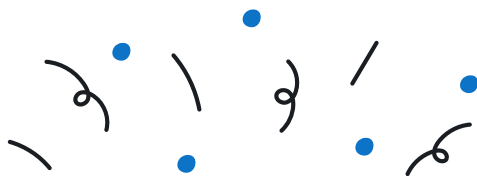

We are going to visit the Food Pantry and learn what happens with our can of beans, or boxes of cereal.



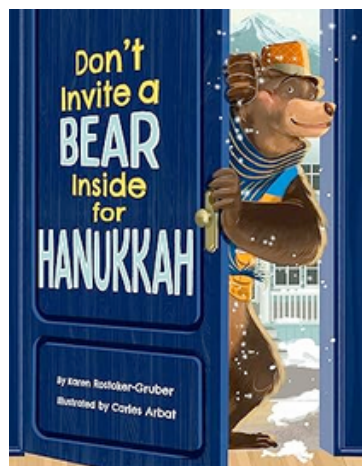

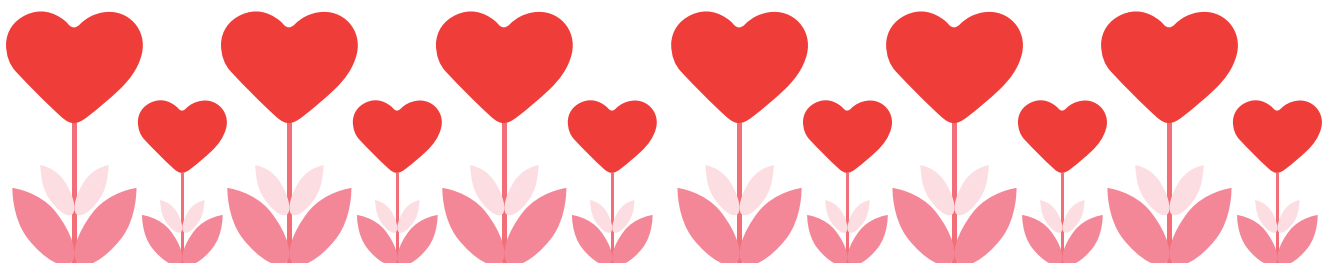

When the Talmud arrived in Europe, its lessons had to be applied to Jewish life in a very different world from that of its origins.

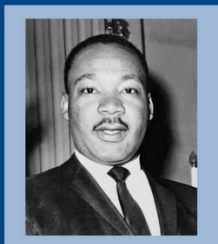
